**COUNCIL BUSINESS:** At the June Council meeting, the Council:

- Listened to a presentation by Jason Mulvihill-Kuntz with the WRIS8 Salmon Recovery Council about that group's work to restore native salmon runs to Puget Sound and the watersheds that feed into it. - Discussed comments from the Washington State Dept. of Commerce and the Puget Sound Regional Council concerning the Town's draft Comprehensive Plan updates. The Council will be taking action soon to adopt an updated Comprehensive Plan.
- Reviewed a draft Capital Improvement Plan and Transportation Improvement Program. The Council will review a final version and act on it at the July Council meeting.
- Discussed ideas for maintaining signs with the original Beaux Arts street names.
- Continued discussing proposed changes to the Town's parking rules, focusing on making the rules more clear and enforceable. This discussion will continue until a proposed ordinance is ready for review and action.
- Discussed ideas for improving ROW Maintenance in areas that are not easily adopted by adjacent neighbors, ranging from hiring a firm to handle the maintenance to organizing an Adopt-a-Block program similar to the Adopt-a-Highway program.
- Continued discussing progress on meeting goals set in the Council's Strategic Plan, particularly as they relate to stormwater management and ROW maintenance.

**NEXT COUNCIL MEETING:** The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be held at 7:00pm on **Tuesday July 21, 2015** at Cynthia Hudson's house. Please watch your local mailstand and the Town's website for the meeting agenda. Head's up: this meeting has been continued to a date one week later than usual.

**COURTHOUSE:** The "Bellevue Courthouse" or Bellevue District Court, also known as King County District Court, East Division, has moved to a new location in Bellefield Office Park, at 1309 114th Ave.

SE. It is a few blocks south of its former location at Surrey Downs Park. The newly remodeled building features improved security and better access for people with disabilities. This facility provides court services for the cities of Bellevue and Beaux Arts. King County continues to provide district court services at the new location under an agreement with the city. The first day at the new location was Monday, June 22. A separate [Probation Division](#), operated by the City of Bellevue, also has moved to the 29,486-square-foot building. Parking is available at the courthouse, which is located near several bus routes. A variety of cases are processed through [King County District Court, East Division](#), as the Bellevue Courthouse is officially known. Charges made by the City of Bellevue may include traffic infractions, misdemeanors and gross misdemeanors. Misdemeanor defendants make up about 11 percent of visits to the court. **FIREWORKS:** Residents are reminded that Chapter 9.05.010 of the Beaux Arts Village Municipal Code <http://www.codepublishing.com/WA/BeauxArts/> prohibits the discharge of fireworks, and are encouraged to enjoy the holiday safely by attending one of several public fireworks displays in the area. Follow these tips from Bellevue's Fire Marshal to enjoy a family-friendly Fourth:

- Respect Bellevue's ban on fireworks; they are illegal and may be prosecuted as a misdemeanor or civil violation. Bellevue Police and Fire will conduct fireworks safety patrols and enforcement.
- Practice fire safety - it may be unusually dry this year! In 2013 Washington State reported 239 injuries from fireworks and 102 fires caused by fireworks. The National Weather Service is predicting above average temperatures for our region and already had numerous brush fires.
- Keep your pets safely indoors with some distraction or a quiet place. Use a leash if you must be outside with your pet, have proper ID tags and practice safety as pets may try to sniff or eat fireworks and pet hair can easily catch fire.
- Enjoy public displays in and around Bellevue on July 4, including the Bellevue Family 4th at Downtown Park <http://bellevue.com/fireworks.php> and celebrations in Newcastle's Lake Boren Park and Kirkland's Marina Park.

**FOURTH OF JULY:** Killarney Circle has their annual 4th of July Concert /Parade on Saturday at 10:30am. Area neighbors are welcome to attend. Kids can bring decorated bikes, dog or themselves; please try to walk or park outside the Circle.

**KING COUNTY SHERIFF COMMUNITY MEETING:** Thank you to those who attended Beaux Arts Crime and Safety Meeting on June 16th. Captain Greg Thomas from King County Sheriff's Office, Beaux Arts' contract Sheriff Department, answered questions about personal and property safety and recent crime trends. Below are just a few of his tips:

- Where is your ladder? Keep it secured so it's not used against you to reach an open, upper-story window or balcony door.
- If a solicitor knocks or rings and the resident does not wish to speak with or otherwise engage the "solicitor," it is important that the "solicitor" know that someone is home: flash the front porch lights or knock on the inside of the front door or window. Burglary of one's possessions is bad enough... but not compared to someone getting hurt by burglars inside a home being surprised by the resident.
- Burglaries are often midday, midweek, through sliding glass doors, French doors, or windows that are easy to break through. Secure your entry points!

- Cars – An unlocked vehicle is an easy target, but unless valuables are secured, keeping it unlocked can be cheaper than a broken window! Consider the situation and what you can lose, and remove all valuables whenever possible. Thieves know to check under your seats and in your glovebox /trunk!
- Professional thefts often work in teams of three with a driver parked in a car for lookout/get-away, while the other two are on foot with backpacks, or one is breaking into a car for the registration and calling the others with an address to hit.
- You can ask solicitors for their state issued photo ID, particularly a driver's license. If you ask a solicitor to leave your property, they must. No one is allowed on your front porch/walk without your permission, whether you have a "No Soliciting" sign or not.
- If you put your lights on timers while out of town on vacation, have a neighbor change the on/off times occasionally. Just like in "Home Alone," criminals quickly realize people are out of town when their lights turn on at the same time each evening!

**MARSHAL Reminder: Boat Trailer Storage:** It's that time of year again! Boats have been brought out of storage and now the question is, "Where do I store my trailer for the summer?" Just a quick reminder that your driveway and front yard are not considered a proper storage facility. For those of us that have forgotten the Parking Code, (<http://www.codepublishing.com/WA/BeauxArts/>, see Chapter 10 for the full code), key points for storage are listed below for your viewing pleasure. Thank you, your cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated. Contact Deputy Marshal Scott Harpster with questions. **10.10.010 Definitions.** "Recreational, commercial, or utility vehicle" means any of, but not limited to, the following: boats, campers, boat trailers, travel trailers, pickup campers, coaches, motorized dwellings, recreational vehicles, tent trailers, utility trailers, trucks, machinery, commercial vehicles, camper tops or shells, and buses.

**10.10.020 Parking provisions** (2) Vehicles that are owned by a resident shall be parked on that resident's private property. If this is not possible, these vehicles may be parked on the town right-of-way portion of the driveway, as long as line of sight is not impaired.

(3) Recreational, commercial, or utility vehicles or junkers may be parked as follows:

- (a) In a carport or garage, or on private property if screened as defined in BAVMC [10.10.010](#); and
- (b) **Temporarily parked in a nonscreened area for a period not to exceed a total of two weeks in a one-year period.** An owner may be granted an extension of this time limit by the town marshal upon application, which shall include the signed consent of each adjoining property owner and the property owners across the street, and an explanation of the special circumstances that make the extension necessary.

**MEDIATION RESOURCES:** The Town has learned of the following mediation resources available:  
**City of Bellevue-** Free to those that live, work or go to public school in the City of Bellevue. They have trained teen and adult mediators as well as interpreters if needed. **SEWER UPGRADE PROJECT, KING COUNTY:** Residents just received King County's mailed summer newsletter explaining the Sewer Upgrade for North Mercer Island and Enatai that will impact Beaux Arts. It is in the design phase now, followed by a 3 year construction phase beginning in 2019. You may meet the King County Wastewater Treatment Division (WTD) staff on July 11-12 on Mercer Island's Summer Celebration <http://www.mercergov.org/SectionIndex.asp?SectionID=61>, where they will have their rolling education center, and sewer inspection truck available for people to tour, learn about the sewer system in the North Mercer Island/Southwest Bellevue area, see their sewer robots, and get a virtual tour of the sewers. WTD is in the early stages of a sewer upgrade project that will involve a pipeline extending from the County's North Mercer Pump Station across Lake Washington to the Sweylocken Pump Station in southwest Bellevue, by Mercer Slough. This is an early opportunity for you to meet some of the North Mercer/Enatai Sewer Upgrade Project team. **SOLID WASTE INFORMATION: RECYCLING REMINDER** - Republic Services reports that a load of recycling caught **fire** recently when hot ash lit paper inside of a collection vehicle. Fire investigators determined that a barbeque grill with warm ash was placed in a recycling container and caught the truckload on fire. This was a very dangerous situation with (thankfully) a happy ending. Please remember that the following\* CANNOT be placed inside your curbside containers:

- \*No hot (or warm) ashes
- \*No batteries
- \*No electronics
- \*No florescent tubes or bulbs
- \*No pharmaceuticals
- \*No hazardous material (labels may say "poison," "danger," "caution" or "warning")

**Do You Have More Recycle / Yard Waste Than Will Fit In Your Can?** Beaux Arts residents have mentioned an interest in having their recycled and yard materials and yard-waste collected every week. Due to the constraints of our franchise with Republic Services, changing our pickup schedule is not an option; HOWEVER:

- On "recycle days" you may leave out unlimited amounts of recycled material for pickup.
- On "yard-waste days", you may leave out the equivalent of an extra can of yard-waste materials.
- In both cases, the materials need to be presented for collection in cardboard boxes or brown Kraft bags clearly marked as either "RECYCLE" or "YARD WASTE".

**TRAFFIC FOR SEWER WORK: BELLEVUE LANE REDUCTIONS ON 112TH AVE SE:** Starting July 6 and through early 2016, 112th Avenue Southeast will be reduced to one southbound and one northbound lane for various segments between Bellevue Way SE and north of SE 8<sup>th</sup> Street due to one of numerous sewer improvement projects in the works by Bellevue Utilities. The improvements are needed to increase sewer capacity that will serve the downtown area as it continues to grow, and to replace aging infrastructure. Work hours will be between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, with potential weekend and evening work for limited periods as necessary for working through intersections. Lane reductions will remain in place during both work and non-work hours. Expect heavy equipment, delivery of materials, construction noise and traffic delays. **DOCKMASTER REPORT:** We wait all year for summer to take advantage of the wonderful warm weather and our boating opportunities. So for those of you that have moorage at our docks, it is time to USE YOUR BOAT! Remember that the WABA dock rules state that moorage may be canceled for

nonuse for an entire summer or for infrequent use; we have a long waiting list for those slips! Of course, do it safely by observing the rules and remember to have life vests for everyone on board.

Representatives of the Washington State Department of Revenue will be conducting vessel inspections for proper registration (2016 registration stickers) at the Beaux Arts docks on or about July 9<sup>th</sup>. The 2015 registration stickers will expire as of June 30 and 2016 stickers need to be on your boat by then. Also, I am required to provide them with the names and addresses of the owner of any boat that is not properly registered. If you have any questions, please contact Dock Master Jay Jacobsen.

**DOG RULES:** Continuing through Labor Day, the WABA Summer Dog Rules are in effect:

- a. Dogs are never allowed at the swim beach or dock during the summer.
- b. Dogs are allowed on the north end of the beach and lawn extending from the northern boundary of the Town of Beaux Arts to the opening in the break wall to the southwest corner of the tennis court.
- c. Dogs may be walked from the northern part of the beach at the eastern edge of the lawn to the southern access road up behind the center BBQ.
- d. The summer dog swimming area is located at the opening in the break wall at the north end of the beach.

Please be respectful of others and do not allow your dog to disrupt members using the picnic tables, and always clean up after your dog! There are pet waste bag dispensers located at the center beach and at the north end. A complete list of the rules is in Section 11 of your Greenbook.

**4<sup>th</sup> of July:** Fireworks are banned within the Town of Beaux Arts and are NOT allowed on our beach or docks. Northwest Security will be running extra patrols the night of the 4<sup>th</sup> to ensure safety.

## 2015 Water Quality Report

This Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) has been prepared for your information to comply with a Federal law, which requires that water utilities provide water quality information to customers each year. The information is based on water samples taken before 2015.

This report is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we have provided. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards.

Some of the people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other Microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

 Your water comes from one groundwater source located near the community.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves through naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- *Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.*
- *Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.*
- *Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.*
- *Radioactive contaminants, which are naturally occurring.*
- *Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.*

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the Department of Health and EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health. These regulations require that water systems sample for lead and copper, Inorganic (iron, manganese, etc.), Volatile Organic (gasoline derivatives), radionuclides and Synthetic Organic Chemicals (pesticides) on a regular basis. In addition, we sample for coliform bacteria monthly.

Additional testing has been submitted with no detections to report.
