COUNCIL BUSINESS: The following discussions took place at the June Council meeting:

- Don Marsh with CENSE (Coalition of Eastside Neighborhoods for Sensible Energy, appeared before the Council with resident Carol Clemett to urge Villagers to take a look at their concerns about PSE’s recent expansion plans for power transmission on the Eastside.
- The Council passed
 - > Ordinance No. 422 adopting the amended State Building Code as required by state statute.
 - > Ordinance No. 423 adopting standards for road restorations, including detailed drawings depicting those standards.
- The Council began deliberating about the projects that should appear on the next six-year Capital Investment Plan, which includes street projects for the Transportation Improvement Program. Further discussion will take place in July during a public hearing followed by Council action.

NEXT COUNCIL MEETING: The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be held at 7:00pm on **Tuesday, July 12, 2016** at Cynthia Hudson’s house.

BELLEVUE HOV PROJECT: The City of Bellevue’s ‘Bellevue Way SE HOV’ lane project has launched an online open house which provides new information on the design options analysis and feedback opportunities: <http://bellevuewayhovopenhouse.participate.online/>. This site will be accessible until July 15. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT - WIN 211: *WIN 211 exists to make people’s lives better; to enhance community resiliency; to identify and break cycles of need, and to help organizations, foundations, businesses, individuals and government more efficiently distribute resources.*

The Washington Information Network 2-1-1 (WIN 211) – a coalition of existing local providers of information and referral services and local United Ways from every region of the state – was incorporated as a nonprofit corporation under the laws of the State of Washington in August 2001 and was recognized by the IRS as a 501(c) 3 nonprofit organization in April 2002. What is 2-1-1?

- An easy-to-remember phone number for people to call for health and human service information and referrals and other assistance to meet their needs.
- 2-1-1 is standards-driven. These standards include training, quality assurance procedures, effective E management practices and program evaluation.
- 2-1-1 reaches approximately 291 million people (93% of the total U.S. population) covering all 50 states (including 39 states with 90%+ coverage), the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

Why is it important?

- 2-1-1 provides simple access to the variety of essential services people need to lead healthier, more productive lives.
- 2-1-1 provides real-time tracking of community needs, allowing policy makers and funders to make informed decisions about resource allocation.
- 2-1-1 builds community by connecting people with the programs and agencies who can put their donations and volunteer time to good use.

Who supports 2-1-1?

- United Way of America and the Alliance of Information and Referral Systems are leading the effort to develop a nationwide, integrated 2-1-1 system.
- In Washington State, the Legislature designated the Washington Information Network 2-1-1 (WIN 211) as the lead organization to plan, develop, implement and support a 2-1-1 network.

FIREWORKS: Residents are reminded that Chapter 9.05.010 of the Beaux Arts Village Municipal Code <http://www.codepublishing.com/WA/BeauxArts/> prohibits the discharge of fireworks (this includes the beach!), and are encouraged to enjoy the holiday safely by attending one of several public fireworks displays in the area. Follow these tips from Bellevue's Fire Marshal to enjoy a family-friendly fourth:

- Respect Bellevue's ban on fireworks (this includes the parks!); they are illegal and may be prosecuted as a misdemeanor or civil violation. Bellevue Police and Fire will conduct fireworks safety patrols and enforcement.
- Practice fire safety! Each year Washington State reports hundreds of injuries from fireworks and fires caused by fireworks.
- Keep your pets safely indoors with some distraction or a quiet place. Use a leash if you must be outside with your pet, have proper ID tags and practice safety as pets may try to sniff or eat fireworks and pet hair can easily catch fire.
- Enjoy public displays in and around Bellevue on July 4, <http://seattle.curbed.com/maps/4th-of-july-fireworks-seattle-where-to-watch>, including the Bellevue Family 4th at Downtown Park <http://bellevue.com/fireworks.php> and Newcastle's Lake Boren Park and Kirkland's Marina Park.

FOURTH with KILLARNEY CIRCLE PARADE: The Killarney Circle neighborhood has invited all surrounding neighbors to join them in their annual 4th of July celebration! Kids can bring decorated bikes, dogs and even decorate themselves; there will be prizes awarded for the most patriotic! Parking is limited so walking is encouraged! Meet at SE 23rd and 104th Place SE on July 4th at 10:30am to hear the Killarney Circle Band perform, then follow the Bellevue Fire Dept. in the parade around the Circle!

GOLF CARTS: Earlier this year, the Town adopted Ordinance 421 http://www.beauxarts-wa.gov/pdf_files/Ords/ord421_golf_carts.pdf allowing Golf Carts within Beaux Arts. The signs are up, and the registration forms are being posted to the Town's website <http://www.beauxarts->

wa.gov/whats_new.htm. Deputy Clerk Angela Kulp will handle annual golf-cart registration. Here's how that process will work:

- The Golf-Cart Owner will fill out the golf-cart registration form and contact the Deputy Clerk for an appointment and payment.
- A permanent Golf Cart registration identification number will be assigned. This cart number will stay with the cart as long as it is used in Beaux Arts, much like your car's license plate or your boat's vessel identification number.
- Annual registrations will include a colored registration decal sticker for the current year (2016 will be green).
- Once the cart is registered, the owner will affix their colored annual registration decal sticker and permanent registration ID number to the cart's rear bumper. ID letters and numbers must be block style and at least 3" high. This mirrors boat registration numbers, per the state's requirements: <http://www.dol.wa.gov/forms/420082.pdf>.
- It is important to note that by signing the registration form, all golf-cart owners are certifying to the Town that their cart meets the requirements and that they will make sure it is operated according to our rules and the rules of the road. Those owners are also acknowledging that the Town has NOT inspected their cart for any of the safety features required by the Golf Cart Code. So the owners bear the full responsibility should they or any other operator of their cart break those rules.

MARSHAL REPORT: Resident reports, followed by some crime prevention tips

- We've had a resident report trash dumping consistently in private property bushes near SE 27th and 103rd Ave. SE. If you know anything about this dumping, please contact Marshal Walter Scott or Deputy Clerk Angela Kulp.
- Residents on upper SE 27th have reported a high amount of dead wildlife; rat poison is suspected. Please remember that rat poison can also be dangerous to others including our pets and children, and it can be passed up the food chain as well. Please consider natural, safe alternatives if you are having a pest issue.

Shortened reminders from emails sent to residents last week about solicitation and theft are as follows:

- Many residents reported an aggressive solicitor, prompting calls to the Sheriff. Soliciting is not illegal and does not need a permit. But if you are concerned about solicitors, consider a "No Soliciting" sign, ask for ID, and call the police if someone does not leave your property when asked.
- In the past 3 months; we've seen an uptick in property theft, from the beach & docks recently and from one residence in April previously reported. Cable locks on some property did not deter, so this indicates that these were planned thefts, requiring 2-3 people, scoped out in advance then returning with supplies and transportation. If you know anything about the recent thefts, please contact Marshal Walter Scott. In the meantime, what can we do? Reminders include:
 - **Lock it or lose it** - locks DO deter! Photos and license plates help too!
 - **See and Say** – If you see something suspicious or find yourself a victim, report it!
 - **Track it** – new tech devices with GPS can help! Some neighbors are also using cameras.
 - **Mark your own property** – It helps reunite you with property; try your driver's license #!
 - **Take some effort to recover your stuff** – Check out Craigslist, E-Bay, local pawn shops!
 - **Approach strangers** – Maybe, probably and usually it's a new neighbor, their guest or contractor. Kindness works! If not, they know you're watching; also a good deterrent.

PSE UTILITY RELOCATION PROJECT: Puget Sound Energy's work on undergrounding electrical for Sound Transit's construction of East Link light rail continues, impacting Bellevue Way at 113th Ave. SE & SE 30th St. through July: http://pse.com/inyourcommunity/pse-projects/Pages/Project-map.aspx?WT.mc_id=1148.

SOUND TRANSIT PROJECT UPDATE: The Sound Transit Board has sent their Final ST3 Plan to the November Ballot for a vote! Sound Transit 3 includes light rail to Everett, Tacoma, downtown Redmond, Kirkland, Issaquah, Ballard and West Seattle; bus rapid transit on I-405; Sounder south expansions. ST3 caps 3-1/2 years of input to complete regional light rail as the area's population grows an estimated 800,000 by 2040. The ST3 plan will build a total of 62 miles of light rail with stations serving 37 additional areas. Improvements will speed up most of the extensions by two to five years.

If approved by voters in November, ST3 would also build light rail between South Kirkland, Bellevue and Issaquah, while expediting buses, expand Sounder commuter rail service all over the Puget Sound region. Details of the plan are available at www.soundtransit3.org, including an interactive map. The ST3 Plan's \$53.8 billion in investments would be funded through new voter-approved sales, MVET and property taxes, with estimated additional \$200 annual or \$17 monthly costs for a typical adult in the Sound Transit District. If implemented, the ST3 Plan is projected to quintuple Sound Transit ridership. The www.soundtransit3.org website includes a presentation and interactive map, summarizing the public input. Questions? WABA / Western Academy of Beaux Arts NEWS:

BOARD MEETING: The next meeting of the WABA Board of Trustees will be on **Thursday, July 7, 2016** at 7:00pm at the Park/Morlock residence.

BEAUX ARTS RACING FLEET C-15 REGATTA: The Beaux Arts Racing Fleet is hosting an invitational regatta in conjunction with the C15 North American Championships on July 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Members are invited and encouraged to attend the six daily races and the pot luck dinner on Saturday evening once racing has finished for the day. Please bring a dish to share and help us welcome our visitors! Visitors will begin arriving Thursday evening June 30th and will be parking trailers in the north beach parking lot this weekend.

DOG RULES FOR BEACH: Please follow these rules year-round with your dog at the beach, also posted on the WABA website, <http://waba1908.com/>:

- Dogs must be accompanied by a human at all times, be under control – voice or leash – and must not be a nuisance to other people using any part of the WABA property.
- Owners must clean up after their dogs at all times. *Pet waste* stations are located in two areas of the beach. Mitts for clean-up are provided. Please put waste in the receptacle marked “pet waste”.
- Dogs must be kept on trails while passing through the Woodlands areas. Dogs are *not* permitted to roam free in the restoration areas!

DOG RULES FOR BEACH- SUMMER: The Summer Dog Rules are in effect now; Dogs are **not** allowed on the *swim* beach Memorial Day - Labor Day. These are **additional restrictions** on dog walking and dog swimming in effect from **Memorial Day through Labor Day**:

- Dogs are never allowed at the swim beach or dock during the summer.
- Any unaccompanied dog found at the swim beach during the summer will be tied up in the south parking lot by the lifeguard and, if the owner cannot be located, will be released when the lifeguard goes off duty.
- Dogs are allowed on the north end of the beach and lawn extending from the northern boundary to the Town of Beaux Arts, south to the opening in the break wall and east to the southwest corner of the tennis court.
- Dogs may be walked from the northern part of the beach to the southern access road using a 10-foot strip along the eastern edge of the lawn.

FOURTH OF JULY: Fireworks are prohibited at the beach! They put our boats, docks, and trees at risk anyway so please go enjoy a safe, public display instead!

MASTERS REPORTS: From the WABA volunteers that tirelessly oversee and manage our community waterfront assets, updates follow from BeachMaster Forrest Kulp, DockMaster Jay Jacobsen and Woodlands Master Julia Morse:

- **BEACHMASTER:** Please remember to scoop up after your dog and use the pet waste receptacles on the beach. If you want to help me out, pick up litter as you walk, or tidy up the restroom after use; your efforts only take a second of your time. Everyone will enjoy a cleaner beach! The garbage and recycling have their own bins in the parking lots and it's a big help to Republic when you keep items sorted properly; otherwise I get to do it for them. Also, please do not leave fires unattended; this becomes a fire danger. Thank you!- Forrest
- **DOCKMASTER REPORT:** There has been a series of thefts of kayaks from the beach area over the past 3 weeks. Please secure your kayaks, canoes, paddle boards, etc. Also, please be alert to people you don't know at the beach. Politely introduce yourself; you will most likely meet a neighbor! On a happier note: we wait all year for summer to take advantage of the wonderful warm weather and our boating opportunities. So for those of you that have moorage at our docks, it is time to **USE YOUR BOAT!** Remember that the WABA dock rules state that moorage may be canceled for nonuse for an entire summer or for infrequent use; we have a long waiting list for those slips! Of course, do it safely by observing the rules and remember to have life vests for everyone on board. If you have any questions, please call Dock Master Jay Jacobsen.
- **WOODLANDS:** Thank you for staying on the trails and keeping your dogs out of the restoration plantings! Please see Julia with any questions.

PARKING AT THE BEACH: Please make sure that your cars and those of your guests properly display a WABA sticker or guest pass. If you have replaced your vehicle or lost your sticker, please request a new one from the WABA clerk. Guest passes are \$5 to replace, stickers are free. All motorized vehicles must stay in the parking lots at either the north or south ends of the beach, and display proper WABA identification - stickers, hanging tag, or Board approved guest passes. **Reminder, that Golf carts are considered motorized vehicles, and all motorized vehicle rules apply to golf carts while on WABA property.**

SUMMER BEACH USE: Reminders about guests, and reservations, also in a member's 'Greenbook':

- WABA members are responsible for the behavior of their children and their guests while on the beach. Children of WABA members who reside with their parents may have **no more than three (3) guests at a time unless accompanied by a WABA member**. If your teenager uses the beach with friends you must accompany them after 10:30PM OR any time they have more than 3 friends with them.
- Please remember that any group of over 12 people requires a beach reservation. Beach reservation forms are available on the WABA website in the 'member resources' section under 'beach reservations'. You can access the forms after you have signed into the website. Go to www.waba1908.com for more information.
- There are no reservations allowed on Sundays to keep the beach free for members and their families. You are responsible for ALL trash when you have a party at the beach, please do not leave it for others to remove for you. Plan to bring bags with you for easy clean-up, and dispose of everything in your trash/recycling bins at home. If you see trash on the beach, please pick it up.
